# Analysis of Income & Expenditure of National Political Parties for FY 2022-23

# **Detailed Report**

#### Introduction

Political parties have multiple sources of funding and thus accountability and transparency should be an important aspect of their functioning. It is essential to have comprehensive and transparent accounting methods and systems which should reveal the true financial position of the parties.

The Election Commission of India (ECI), in its letter dated 19th November,'14 addressed to the Presidents/General Secretaries of all political parties, stated that it was mandatory for the parties to submit details of their audited reports to the Commission. This report analyses the total income and expenditure incurred, all over India, by the all-National Parties during **FY 2022-23**, as declared by the parties in their annual audit report submitted to the ECI.

The National Parties include Bharatiya Janata Party (**BJP**) Indian National Congress (**INC**), Bahujan Samaj Party (**BSP**), Communist Party of India (Marxist) **CPI(M)**, Aam Aadmi Party (**AAP**) and National People's Party (**NPEP**).

#### I. Status of submission of audited reports by the National Parties, FY 2022-23

- The due date for submission of annual audited accounts for the parties was **31st October**, **'2023**.
- Only CPI(M) submitted its audit report on time while AAP, BSP, NPEP, INC and BJP and submitted after a delay of 5 days, 23 days, 27 days, 64 days and 72 days respectively.


#### II. Total Income and Expenditure of National Political Parties for FY 2022-23

- **BJP** declared a total income of **Rs 2360.844 cr** during FY 2022-23, but spent only **57.68%** (Rs 1361.684 cr) of the total income. **INC's total income** was **Rs 452.375 cr** while the party spent **Rs 467.135 cr**, thus, party's expenditure for that year exceeds its total income by **3.26%**.
- CPI(M)'s total income was Rs 141.661 cr while the party spent Rs 106.067 cr, 74.87% of its income.
- AAP's total income was Rs 85.17 cr while the party spent Rs 102.051 cr. The party's expenditure for that year exceeds its total income by 19.82%.
- NPEP declared a total income of Rs 7.562 cr during FY 2022-23, and spent Rs 6.932 cr (91.67%) of it.


#### III. Total Income of National Parties for FY 2022-23

- The total Income of the National Parties has been compiled from the income from various sources pan India, as submitted in their annual audit reports.
- 6 National Parties (BJP, INC, CPI(M), AAP, BSP and NPEP) have declared a total income of Rs 3076.882 cr, collected from all over India.
- **BJP** has shown the highest income amongst the National Parties, an **income** of **Rs 2360.844 cr** during FY 2022-23. This forms **76.73% of the total income of 6 National Parties** during FY 2022-23.
- **INC** declared the second highest income of **Rs 452.375 cr** which forms **14.70%** of the total income of the 6 National Parties.
- NPEP declared the least income of **Rs 7.562 cr** which forms a mere **0.25%** of the total income of the 6 National Parties during the FY 2022-23.








#### IV. Comparison of total income of National Political Parties between FY 2021-22 & FY 2022-23

- Between FY 2021-22 and 2022-23, the income of BJP increased by 23.15% (Rs 443.724 cr) from Rs 1917.12 cr during FY 2021-22 to Rs 2360.844 cr during FY 2022-23.
- Income of NPEP increased by 1502.12% (Rs 7.09 cr) from Rs 47.20 lakhs during FY 2021-22 to Rs 7.562 cr during FY 2022-23 and Income of AAP increased by 91.23% (Rs 40.631 cr) from Rs 44.539 cr during FY 2021-22 to Rs 85.17 cr during FY 2022-23.
- Between FY 2021-22 and 2022-23, the **income of INC, CPI(M)** and **BSP decreased** by **16.42%** (Rs 88.90 cr), **12.68%** (Rs 20.575 cr) and **33.14%** (Rs 14.508 cr), respectively.






#### V. Top 3 sources of income of National Parties for FY 2022-23

- National Parties have declared donations/contributions as one of their 3 main sources of income.
   National Parties that received highest income from donations/contributions include BJP Rs 2120.0642 cr, INC Rs 268.6278 cr, AAP Rs 84.3416 cr, CPI(M) Rs 63.783 cr and NPEP Rs 7.523 cr.
- Collection by Issuing Coupons of Rs 125.7676 cr declared by INC form 27.80% of its total income during FY 2022-23.



#### VI. Top 3 items of expenditure of National Parties for FY 2022-23

- The maximum expenditure for BJP has been towards Election/General Propaganda which amounted to Rs 1092.1558 cr followed by expenses towards Administrative Costs, Rs 191.4276 cr.
- The maximum expenditure for INC has been towards Administrative & General Expenses which amounted to Rs 235.839 cr followed by expenses towards Election Expenditure, Rs 192.556 cr.
- AAP spent the maximum of Rs 58.829 cr on Propaganda Expenses followed by expenditure of Rs 36.341 cr on Election Expenditure.
- CPI(M) and BSP have incurred the maximum spending on Administrative & General Expenses of Rs 55.596 cr and Rs 16.2779 cr, respectively.
- NPEP declared to have spent **95.54%** of its total expenditure during FY 2022-23 on **Election Expenditure** (Rs 6.623 cr).

#### Major items of Expenditure of National Parties which have incurred highest expenses, FY 2022-23 (in Rs Cr)










#### VII. All sources of income declared by National Parties, FY 2022-23

- **3 National parties** namely BJP, INC and AAP collected **49.096%** (Rs 1510.6199 cr) of their total **income from** donations through **Electoral Bonds** for FY 2022-23. **BJP** received donations through Electoral Bonds worth **Rs 1294.1499 cr, INC** received **Rs 171.02 cr** and **AAP** received **Rs 45.45 cr**.
- During FY 2022-23, 6 National Parties declared receiving an income from **Donations/Contributions**, a total of **Rs 1033.7197 cr**.
- **Rs 532.5424 cr** was income generated through **other sources of income** by National parties during FY 2022-23.

# **Observations of ADR**

- AAP, BSP, NPEP, INC and BJP parties submitted their audit reports after a delay of **5 days** to **72 days**.
- The most common and popular items of expenditure for National parties for FY 2022-23 are election expenses and administrative/general expenses.
- As per the data shared by SBI in response to ADR's RTI application, Electoral Bonds worth **Rs 2797.3569 cr** were redeemed by parties in FY 2022-23. **54% (Rs 1510.6199 cr)** of this has been redeemed by National Parties.
- **3 National parties** namely BJP, INC and AAP collected **49.096** % (Rs 1510.6199 cr) of their total **income from** donations through **Electoral Bonds** for FY 2022-23. **BJP** received donations through Electoral Bonds worth **Rs 1294.1499 cr, INC** received **Rs 171.02 cr** and **AAP** received **Rs 45.45 cr**.
- Given the anonymity provided to donors by the scheme, it was seen that Electoral Bonds emerged as
  the most popular mode of donations to National Political parties for FY 2021-22 as well. Only 4 National
  Parties (BJP, INC, NCP and AITC) have received Donations through Electoral Bonds (Rs 1811.9425 cr),
  wherein the identity of the donor is not disclosed to the public. Of the Regional parties that have
  submitted their audit reports, 10 Regional Parties Parties (DMK, BJD, BRS, YSR-Congress, JDU, SP, AAP,
  SAD, MGP and TDP) have declared receiving donations through Electoral Bonds worth Rs 852.88 cr in
  FY 2021-22.
- During FY 2022-23, out of the 6 National parties, only **2 Parties** (INC Rs 125.7676 cr and **CPI(M)** Rs 11.031 cr) declared receiving a total income of **Rs 136.7986 cr** from **Sale of Coupons.**

## **Recommendations of ADR**

- The Supreme Court gave a judgment on September 13, 2013 declaring that no part of a candidate's affidavit should be left blank. Along the same lines, we recommend that the Election Commission India impose rules that **no part of the Form 24A submitted by political parties providing details of donations above Rs 20,000 should be left blank.**
- Full details of all **donors should be made available for public scrutiny under the RTI**. Some countries where this is done include Bhutan, Nepal, Germany, France, Italy, Brazil, Bulgaria, the US and Japan. In none of these countries is it possible for 70% of the source of funds to be unknown.
- According to the Finance Act, 2017, Section 13A of the IT Act was amended to state that tax exemption
  will be given to registered political parties "Provided also that such political party furnishes a return of
  income for the previous year in accordance with the provisions of sub-section (4B) of section 139 on or
  before the due date under that section." Thus, any party which does not submit its IT returns on or
  before the due date, their income should not be tax-exempted and defaulting parties should be
  derecognized.
- Those parties not following the ICAI guidelines for auditing of reports should be scrutinized by the IT department.
- All political parties must provide all information on their finances under the Right to Information Act. This will only strengthen political parties, elections and democracy.
